The Common Council of the City of Madison, Indiana, met in regular session at 5:30 P.M. at City Hall, 101 W. Main Street.

Mayor Courtney opened the meeting with the Lord's Prayer followed by the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag.

**PUBLIC COMMENTS:**

Citizen Mike Greco expressed concern of semi-trucks using Jake brakes on Main Street, especially early in the morning. The situation is being addressed.

Citizen Jarrett Boyd expressed her concerns about two dogs along Presbyterian Avenue that come threateningly toward walkers, especially those with small dogs. Mayor Courtney assured her that the police and animal control will address the situation.

Citizen Lisa Ferguson passed out US Flags and wants to help make Madison the most patriotic town in America. She encourages all citizens to display the flag.

Citizen Tanya Righthouse came before the council to report that she has been maintaining an open lot on Mouser Street that is owned by the city. Righthouse feels the city maintaining the property every 6-8 weeks is not enough and it is getting hard for her to do on her own. Mayor Courtney said he has plans to rectify the situation.

**MAYOR'S COMMENTS:**

Mayor Courtney reported that the partnership with the city and the Indiana Health Department has been great. In the last 4 weeks 1025 people have been tested at the city facility. That is 25% of the cumulative number of tests done in the county. The testing will be extended to October 2<sup>nd</sup> and a person does not have to be symptomatic. Courtney thanked all involved and feels Jefferson County is faring quite well. Courtney gave a shout out to the organizers of the "Five to the Five" event in September and reiterated how hard the organizers are working. Courtney thanked the community for continuing to promote local tourism through the Covid crisis. Events like Music in the Park have still been very successful. The city paving projects are being developed and close to starting. The project along St. Michaels Avenue and the Cotton Mill is being bid out. Weather permitting, Crystal Beach will be open until Labor Day.

Thevenow made a motion to adjourn, seconded by Creech. All in favor, motion carried (7-0).

**WHEREAS**, the benefits of preventing and overcoming mental health challenges and substance abuse are significant and valuable to individuals, families, and our community at large; and

**WHEREAS**, it is essential that we educate residents about suicide, mental health and substance abuse problems and the ways they affect all people in the community; and

**WHEREAS**, we must encourage relatives, friends, co-workers, and providers to recognize the signs of a problem, and guide those in need to appropriate services and supports; and

**WHEREAS**, Suicide Prevention Week and Recovery Month inspire millions of Americans to raise awareness, build resiliency, and find hope.

ORDINANCE NO. 2020-\_\_\_\_\_

**AN ORDINANCE OF THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MADISON REPEALING THE MICRO-LOAN PROGRAM OF THE CITY OF MADSION AND TRANSFERING THE BALANCE OF THE REMAINING FUNDS TO THE ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT REVOLVING LOAN FUND.**

WHEREAS, the City of Madison maintains and operates a revolving loan fund.

WHEREAS, the City of Madison's revolving loan fund is a tool available to the City of Madison to make loans for new and revolving businesses located within the City of Madison.

WHEREAS, on April 20, 1999, the City of Madison had created a Micro-Loan program in conjunction with the US Department of Agriculture's Micro-Loan Grant Program to promote and aid small business entrepreneurship in starting and/or expanding business for job creation and city economic growth.

WHEREAS, the City of Madison and the Common Council believe that it would be in the best interest of the City to incorporate the remaining funds held in the Micro-Loan program into the monies made available through the City of Madison Economic Development Revolving Loan Fund.

WHEREAS, currently the City of Madison Micro-Loan fund has a balance of \$96,769.07.

WHEREAS, the Common Council of the City of Madison desires to repeal the Micro-Loan program as outlined in City of Madison Municipal Code 35.32.

WHEREAS, from and after this date, any funds received as payments or previously made pursuant to the Micro-Loan Program shall be deposited into the City of Madison Economic Development Revolving Loan Fund.

WHEREAS, upon deposit of the funds from the City of Madison Micro-Loan Fund into the Economic Development Revolving Loan Fund any monies distributed shall be done so pursuant to City of Madison Code 35.16 as found in the book of Ordinances.

WHEREAS, the City of Madison is committed to enhancing all aspects of economic development and feel that this economic development tool will have a positive impact on the City of Madison now and in the future.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MADISON, INDIANA:

1. The Common Council of the City of Madison, Indiana hereby requests that the funds on deposit and future monies collected pursuant to the City of Madison Micro-Loan Program shall be deposited and utilized pursuant to the rules created for the City of Madison Revolving Loan Fund.
2. City of Madison Municipal Code 35.32 is hereby repealed and shall no longer be in effect.
3. This Ordinance shall become immediately effective upon its adoption by the Common Council, signature of the Mayor, enrollment in the book of Ordinances and publication of notice as required by law.
4. Any Ordinance in conflict with this Ordinance is hereby repealed.

**AN ORDINANCE OF THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE  
CITY OF MADISON, INDIANA AMENDING THE METER DEPOSIT ORDINANCE**

WHEREAS, the Common Council of the City of Madison, Indiana has authorized the utility billing office to collect a deposit from each new customer who is a tenant of the premises to which utility service is to be provided; and

WHEREAS, the Common Council finds that the existing ordinance does not provide clarity on how meter deposit funds are to be allocated against delinquent bills; and

WHEREAS, the Common Council of the City of Madison, Indiana finds that without the clarification of this issue some utility customers may abuse the billing system and open accounts at new billing addresses while not being held responsible for previous bills; and

WHEREAS, it is in the best interest of the City of Madison, Indiana and its citizens that the allocation of meter deposit funds against delinquent bills be clarified;

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL OF  
THE CITY OF MADISON, INDIANA, that Chapter 52.23 METER DEPOSIT be amended to  
include the following language:**

Funds received as a meter deposit shall be fully allocated against delinquent charges in  
the following order:

- 1) Wastewater
- 2) Water
- 3) Sanitation
- 4) Other fees or charges.

This Ordinance shall become immediately effective upon its adoption by the Common Council, signature of the Mayor, enrollment in the book of Ordinances, and publication of notice as required by law.

Any Ordinance in conflict with this Ordinance is hereby repealed.

ORDINANCE NO. 2020-15

**AN ORDINANCE OF THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE  
CITY OF MADISON, INDIANA AMENDING ORDINANCE NO. 2015-3  
FLOODPLAIN REGULATIONS**

WHEREAS, the City of Madison previously adopted a flood control ordinance dated March 7, 2015 and now finds it necessary to amend such ordinance in order to provide adequate flood protection to the citizens of the City of Madison, Indiana; and

WHEREAS, the City of Madison desires to amend the previously adopted flood control Ordinance No. 2015-3 in order to better define historic structures within the city limits; and

WHEREAS, the City of Madison believes that these definitions will better serve both the flood protection of the community as well as the historic nature of many of the buildings within the city limits; and

WHEREAS, the City of Madison seeks to correct an error previously made to such ordinance and hereby adopts the following in full replacement of the previous Ordinance No. 2015-3.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MADISON, INDIANA THAT THE FLOOD HAZARD AREAS ORDINANCE PREVIOUSLY ENACTED BE AMENDED TO DELETE THE PREVIOUS DEFINITION OF HISTORIC STRUCTURE UNDER ARTICLE 2 OF ORDINANCE NO. 2015-3 ADOPTED ON MARCH 7, 2015 AND REPLACE THE DEFINITION WITH THE FOLLOWING LANGUAGE:

“Historic Structures” means any structure that meets any of the following:

- (1) Listed individually in the National Register of Historic Places (a listing maintained by the Department of Interior) or preliminarily determined by

the Secretary of the Interior as meeting the requirements for individual listing on the National Register; or

(2) Certified or preliminarily determined by the Secretary of the Interior as contributing to the historical significance of a registered historic district or a district preliminarily determined by the Secretary to qualify as a registered historic district; or

(3) Individually listed on the Indiana State Register of Historic Sites and Structures; or

(4) Individually listed on a local register of historic places in communities with historic preservation programs that have been certified either:

a) By an approved state program as determined by the Secretary of the Interior; or

b) Directly by the Secretary of the Interior in states without approved programs.

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MADISON, INDIANA THAT ARTICLE 2 (“DEFINITIONS”), THE DEFINITION OF “SUBSTANTIAL IMPROVEMENT” SHALL BE REPLACED AS FOLLOWS:

“Substantial Improvement” means any reconstruction, rehabilitation, addition, or other improvement of a structure, the cost of which equals or exceeds 50 percent of the market value of the structure before the “start of construction” of the improvement. This term includes structures that have incurred “repetitive loss” or “substantial damage” regardless of the actual repair work performed. The term does not include improvements of structures to correct existing violations of state or local health, sanitary, or safety code requirements.

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MADISON, INDIANA THAT ARTICLE 2 (“DEFINITIONS”), THE DEFINITION OF “FLOODPLAIN ADMINISTRATOR” SHALL BE ADDED AS FOLLOWS:

“Floodplain Administrator” shall be the City of Madison Building Inspector.

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MADISON, INDIANA THAT ARTICLE 6, SECTION A, SHALL BE REPLACED AS FOLLOWS:

Section A. Designation of Variance.

The City of Madison Floodplain Administrator shall hear and decide all requests for variances from requirements of this Ordinance.

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MADISON, INDIANA THAT ARTICLE 6, SECTION B, DUTIES OF VARIANCE AND APPEALS BOARD, SHALL BE REPLACED AS FOLLOWS:

When it is alleged an error in any requirement, decision, or determination made by the Floodplain Administrator in the enforcement or administration of this Ordinance, an applicant may appeal any such decision to the Board of Zoning Appeals.

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MADISON, INDIANA THAT ARTICLE 6, SECTION C, VARIANCE PROCEDURES, SHALL BE AMENDED AS FOLLOWS: The word “board” shall be replaced with “Floodplain Administrator”.

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MADISON, INDIANA THAT ARTICLE 6, SECTION D, CONDITIONS FOR VARIANCES, SUBSECTION (6) SHOULD BE DELETED.

This Ordinance shall become immediately effective upon its adoption by the Common Council, signature of the Mayor, enrollment in the book of Ordinances, and publication of notice as required by law.

Any Ordinance in conflict with this Ordinance is hereby repealed.

ORDINANCE NO. 2020- 16

**AN ORDINANCE OF THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE  
CITY OF MADISON, INDIANA AMENDING CERTAIN PORTIONS OF THE CITY OF  
MADISON TRAFFIC ORDINANCE AS FOUND IN CHAPTER 70 OF THE CITY OF  
MADISON MUNICIPAL CODE**

WHEREAS, the City of Madison previously adopted a Traffic Ordinance dated July 3, 1958 and which was amended over the years, and now finds it necessary to amend such ordinance in order to provide traffic protection and regulations for the citizens of the City of Madison, Indiana; and

WHEREAS the City of Madison desires to amend the previous Traffic Ordinance as described earlier in order to better preserve City owned streets and increase safety for the Citizens of Madison, Indiana; and

WHEREAS the City of Madison seeks to correct an error previously made to such ordinance and hereby adopts the following.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MADISON, INDIANA THAT THE TRAFFIC ORDINANCE PREVIOUSLY ENACTED BE AMENDED TO AMEND 70.02 GROSS WEIGHT LIMITS SECTION (A) AND REPLACE WITH THE FOLLOWING LANGUAGE:

No vehicles (other than single axle trucks) having a maximum gross weight of ten tons or more, including vehicle and load weight, shall be permitted on any city street.

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MADISON, INDIANA THAT THE TRAFFIC ORDINANCE PREVIOUSLY ENACTED BE AMENDED TO AMEND 70.02 GROSS WEIGHT LIMITS SECTION (B)(2) AND REPLACE WITH THE FOLLOWING LANGUAGE:

The gross weight limitation imposed by this division (B) shall not apply to any vehicle that has persons, goods, property, or materials to pick up or deliver within the city limits nor shall it apply to commercial vehicles for emergency, school, municipal, or agricultural purposes.

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MADISON, INDIANA THAT THE TRAFFIC ORDINANCE PREVIOUSLY ENACTED BE AMENDED TO AMEND 70.03 TRANSPORTATION OF HAZARDOUS MATERIALS PROHIBITED SECTION (B) AND REPLACE WITH THE FOLLOWING LANGUAGE:

No vehicle shall transport any hazardous material on Vaughn Drive east of Ferry Street for a distance of 1,000 feet or on West Second Street between McIntyre Street and Madison Avenue. Other than the aforementioned streets, the transportation of hazardous materials which comply with Federal, State, and local laws may be permitted elsewhere within the city limits and except as permitted on Indiana state highways 7, 421, 56, and 62, or on Vaughn Drive east of Ferry Street for a distance of 1,000 feet.

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MADISON, INDIANA THAT THE TRAFFIC ORDINANCE PREVIOUSLY ENACTED BE AMENDED TO AMEND 70.99 PENALTY SECTION (B)(1) AND REPLACE WITH THE FOLLOWING LANGUAGE:

Any person or persons who violate the parking and traffic regulations established in Section 70.02 through 70.23 of this chapter, or as part of the traffic plan of any shopping center or business parking area that has entered into an agreement with the city, is guilty of a violation of this chapter and shall be fined in an amount of not less than \$10 and not more than \$100 for each violation.

This Ordinance shall become immediately effective upon its adoption by the Common Council, signature of the Mayor, enrollment in the book of Ordinances, and publication of notice as required by law.

Any Ordinance in conflict with this Ordinance is hereby repealed.
