Common Council Minutes

MEETING DATE: Tuesday, January 20, 2026, at 5:30 PM

MEETING PLACE: City Hall, 101 W. Main Street, Madison, IN 47250

The Common Council of the City of Madison, Indiana, met in regular session at 5:30 P.M. at City Hall, 101 W. Main Street, Madison, IN 47250.

Mayor Bob Courtney opened the meeting with a welcome to BSA Troop 717 who were in attendance followed by the Lord's Prayer and the Pledge of Allegiance.

Present: Thevenow, Krebs, Dattilo, Wilber, Schafer, Bartlett, and Storm were present (7-0).

Minutes: Wilber moved to approve the minutes from the January 6, 2026, regular meeting, seconded by Schafer. All in favor, motion carried (7-0).

Presentation of petitions, memorials, remonstrances, introduction of motion & guests: Officer of the Year

Award: Chief of Police Rick Mundt presented the Officer of the Year award to Patrolman Colton Fox. Throughout 2025, Patrolman Fox consistently showed dedication and professionalism on the night shift. He regularly stepped up when needed, demonstrated strong judgment and investigative skills, and set a solid example for others. He is reliable, proactive, and well respected by his peers for his positive attitude and willingness to help.

Election of President Pro Tempore: Motion: Krebs moved to nominate councilmember Jim Bartlett for President Pro Tempore, seconded by Dattilo. All in favor, motion passes (7-0).

Resolutions or Bills: Ordinance 2026-1: Establishing the Damon L. Welch Park Project Fund (Sponsor – Krebs):

This ordinance creates a special project fund for the construction of Welch Park. **Motion:** Bartlett moved to suspend the rules, and move to a second reading, seconded by Schafer. **Roll Call Vote:** Thevenow – Y, Krebs – Y, Dattilo – Y, Schafer – Y, Storm – Y, Bartlett – Y, Wilber – Y. All in favor, motion carried (7-0).

Reports, recommendations, and other business from standing/select committees of the city council: None.

Reports of city officials: Clerk Treasurer Shirley Rynearson, who was participating telephonically, inquired about discussing the payroll "shortfall" at the end of 2025. Mayor Bob Courtney noted that there is currently no recommendation prepared for Council consideration, and as a result, the item was not scheduled for discussion at this meeting.

Bills on second reading: Ordinance 2026-1: Establishing the Damon L. Welch Park Project Fund (Sponsor – Krebs): Roll Call Vote: Thevenow – Y, Krebs – Y, Dattilo – Y, Schafer – Y, Storm – Y, Bartlett – Y, Wilber – Y. All in favor, ordinance passes (7-0).

Public comment (per sign-up sheet): Lisa Ferguson of 718 East Second Street shared her thoughts on displaying more American flags throughout the community. Shelley Murphy-Smith of 418 East Second Street expressed concerns regarding the temporary stop signs placed downtown, which are currently under consideration for permanent installation. She inquired about the plan moving forward for these stop signs.

Mayor's comments: The current legislative session is about halfway completed and should be concluded by the end of February. The city is still closely following a few that would affect road funding, planning, and zoning, as well as a few changes to Senate Bill 1. Congresswoman Houchin secured nearly \$8 million for critical infrastructure projects across Indiana's 9th District, including a \$1,000,000 CPF for the Crooked Creek Flood Mitigation plan.

The next regular meeting will be held on Tuesday, February 3, 2026, at 5:30 pm.



Proclamation

COMMEMORATING BLACK HISTORY MONTH 2026

WHEREAS, the celebration of Black History was established by Dr. Carter G. Woodson in February 1926 as a time to celebrate African American history and culture. The second week in February was chosen to coincide with the birthdays of Abraham Lincoln and Frederick Douglass. President Gerald Ford officially recognized Black History Month in 1976, calling upon the public to "seize the opportunity to honor the too-often neglected accomplishments of Black Americans in every area of endeavor throughout our history"; and

WHEREAS, Black History Month is a time for citizens of our city, our state, and our country to reflect on the rich history and teachings of Black Americans and honor their progress and achievements in education, economic development, and culture made throughout the world; and

WHEREAS, Madison was a hub to the Underground Railroad Movement and is home to Broadway School, the first commissioned "colored" school in Indiana and our County is home to Eleutherian College, the first college in Indiana that allowed people of color to attend; and

WHEREAS, many other churches and organizations in the Black American community: such as, Broadway Baptist Church, St. Stephen AME Church, and Eureka Lodge, have had a positive impact on our community; and

WHEREAS, the Georgetown settlement on the east end of Madison was a prominent example of a self-supporting free black community in the 1800's; and

WHEREAS, in June 2020, the City of Madison reaffirmed its commitment to promote diversity and inclusion in the community and is making many investments in support of our Black History; and

WHEREAS, the City of Madison is committed to equality and inclusivity and is proud to honor the history and contributions of Black Americans in our community. On November 7, 2024, we hosted a Ribbon Cutting at our newly constructed Legacy Park and unveiled a commissioned bronze bust of George DeBaptiste, a hero who served as stationmaster of Madison's Underground Railroad. In 2023, the city celebrated the restoration of Gaines Park, a symbol of our black heritage and site of the Broadway School. In 2026, the city and the Veteran's Administration recognized Mr. Charles O'Banion with a commemorative flag to be flown each year, as one of the last living Tuskegee airmen.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Bob G. Courtney, Mayor of the City of Madison, Indiana do hereby proclaim the month of February 2026 to be **BLACK HISTORY MONTH** in Madison. I encourage all Madison residents to join me in celebrating and reflecting on the creativity, culture, tradition, and importance of Black Americans in our history.

**RESOLUTION OF THE MADISON CITY COUNCIL OF MADISON, INDIANA AUTHORIZING THE
SUBMITTAL OF THE COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT (CDBG) OWNER OCCUPIED
REHAB GRANT APPLICATION TO THE INDIANA OFFICE OF COMMUNITY AND RURAL AFFAIRS AND
ADDRESSING RELATED MATTERS**

WHEREAS, the Madison City Council of Madison, Indiana recognizes the need to stimulate growth and to maintain a sound economy within its corporate limits: and

WHEREAS, the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974, as amended, authorizes the Indiana office of Community and Rural Affairs to provide grants to local units of government to meet the housing and community development needs of low-and moderate-income persons and/or the elimination of blight; and

WHEREAS, the City of Madison, Indiana has conducted or will conduct public hearings prior to the submission of an application to the Indiana Office of Community and Rural Affairs, said public hearings to assess the housing, public facilities and economic needs of its low-and moderate-income residents:

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the City Council, of Madison, Indiana that:

1. The Mayor is authorized to prepare and submit an application for grant funding for an owner-occupied rehabilitation program and to execute and administer a resultant grant including requisite general administration and project management, contracts and agreements pursuant to regulations of the Indiana Office of Community and Rural Affairs and the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development.
2. The Southeastern Indiana Regional Planning Commission (SIRPC) has committed Fifty-Four Thousand Four Hundred Sixty-Nine Dollars (\$54,469.00) in non-CDBG funds derived from a Housing Preservation Grant to be applied as the required local match for the City of Madison's Owner-Occupied Rehabilitation Program; and the contribution of said non-CDBG funds by SIRPC satisfies the local match requirement associated with the proposed CDBG application and eliminates the need for the City of Madison to provide a local cash match, contingent upon the award of owner-occupied rehabilitation funding by OCRA.



RESOLUTION 2026-2C

Sponsor:

At a duly called meeting of the governing body of Lessee held in accordance with all applicable legal requirements, including open meeting laws, on the 17th day of February, 2026, the following resolution was introduced and adopted:

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE EXECUTION AND DELIVERY OF A MASTER TAX-EXEMPT LEASE PURCHASE AGREEMENT, AND RELATED INSTRUMENTS, AND DETERMINING OTHER MATTERS IN CONNECTION THEREWITH.

WHEREAS, the governing body of the City of Madison, Indiana ("Lessee") desires to obtain certain equipment (the "Equipment") described in the Equipment Schedule to the Master Tax- Exempt Lease Purchase Agreement (collectively, the "Agreement") with U.S. Bancorp Government Leasing and Finance, Inc. ("Lessor"), the form of which has been available for review by the governing body of Lessee prior to this meeting; and

WHEREAS, the Equipment is essential for the Lessee to perform its governmental functions; and

WHEREAS, Lessee has taken the necessary steps, including those relating to any applicable legal bidding requirements, to arrange for the acquisition of the Equipment; and

WHEREAS, Lessee proposes to enter into the Agreement with Lessor substantially in the forms presented to this meeting.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF LESSEE AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. It is hereby found and determined that the terms of the Agreement in the forms presented to this meeting and incorporated in this resolution are in the best interests of Lessee for the acquisition of the Equipment.

Section 2. The Agreement and the acquisition and financing of the Equipment under the terms and conditions as described in the Agreement are hereby approved. The Mayor of Lessee and any other officer of Lessee who shall have power to execute contracts on behalf of Lessee be, and each of them hereby is, authorized to execute, acknowledge and deliver the Agreement with any changes, insertions and omissions therein as may be approved by the officers who execute the Agreement, such approval to be conclusively evidenced by such execution and delivery of the Agreement. The Mayor of the Lessee and any other officer of Lessee who shall have power to do so be, and each of them hereby is, authorized to affix the official seal of Lessee to the Agreement and attest the same.

Section 3. The proper officers of Lessee be, and each of them hereby is, authorized and directed to execute and deliver any and all papers, instruments, opinions, certificates, affidavits and other documents and to do or cause to be done any and all other acts and things necessary or proper for carrying out this resolution and the Agreement.

Section 4. Pursuant to Section 265(b) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended (the "Code"), Lessee hereby specifically designates the Agreement as a "qualified tax-exempt obligation" for purposes of Section 265(b)(3) of the Code.

The undersigned further certifies that the above resolution has not been repealed or amended and remains in full force and effect and further certifies that the Agreement executed on behalf of Lessee are the same as presented at such meeting of the governing body of Lessee, excepting only such changes, insertions and omissions as shall have been approved by the officers who executed the same.

ORDINANCE NO. 2026- 2

**AN ORDINANCE OF THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE
CITY OF MADISON, INDIANA VACATING CERTAIN
ALLEYS AND STREET IN THE CITY OF MADISON, INDIANA**

WHEREAS, Petitioner, Madison Consolidated Schools, presently owns certain real estate located at 800 Lanier Drive in the City of Madison, Jefferson County, Indiana, and more particularly described as Parcel Nos. 39-08-27-000-006.000-007, 39-08-27-223-005.000-007, 39-08-27-223-031.000-007, 39-08-27-223-032.000-007, 39-08-27-223-033.000-007, and 39-08-27-223-034.000-007.

WHEREAS, there are two (2) twelve (12) foot wide alleys and a thirty (30) foot wide right-of-way of Tillman Street noted on the original plat of the Petitioner's above referenced real property. Said alleys and right-of-way have never been developed or used. No need exists for said alleys and street and the vacation of the same would in no way adversely affect the City of Madison, Indiana.

WHEREAS, Petitioner has proposed that the City of Madison vacate the following alleys and street:

(a) 12-foot alley between Lots 26 and 27:

All of that 12-foot wide alley that lies West of Lot 26 and East of Lot 27 and extending from the North right of way of State Street (per plat), now Lanier Drive, to the Westerly extension of the North line of said Lot 26, all in Elias Stapp's West Addition to North Madison, Recorded on December 19th, 1848, in Plat Book 1, Page 55 in the Office of the Recorder of Jefferson County, Indiana, described by Timothy D. Higbie P.S. Indiana #20100067 and based on a survey completed by Survey First, LLC as part of project number 20250045 and described as now measured on said survey as follows:

BEGINNING on the North right of way of said State Street at the Southwest corner of said Lot 26; thence along said North right of way, North 75 degrees 54 minutes 15 seconds West 12.28 feet to the Southeast corner of said Lot 27; thence along the East line of said Lot 27, thence North 01 degree 56 minutes 27 seconds East 232.72 feet to the North line of said platted alley and the Westerly extension

of the North line of said Lot 26; thence along the said North line, South 75 degrees 54 minutes 15 seconds East 12.28 feet to the Northwest corner of said Lot 26; thence along the West line of said Lot 26, South 01 degree 56 minutes 27 seconds West 232.72 feet to the POINT OF BEGINNING, containing 0.06 acres more or less and subject to any easements of record. (See Exhibit 1 attached hereto.)

(b) Tillman Street – 30-foot right-of-way:

All of that 30-foot wide right of way of Tillman Street that lies West of Lot 24 and East of Lot 25 and extending from the North right of way of State Street (per plat), now Lanier Drive, to the Westerly extension of the North line of said Lot 24, all in Elias Stapp's West Addition to North Madison, Recorded on December 19th, 1848, in Plat Book 1, Page 55 in the Office of the Recorder of Jefferson County, Indiana, described by Timothy D. Higbie P.S. Indiana #20100067 and based on a survey completed by Survey First, LLC as part of project number 20250045 and described as now measured on said survey as follows:

BEGINNING on the North right of way of State Street, now Lanier Drive at the Southwest corner of said Lot 24; thence along said right of way, North 75 degrees 54 minutes 15 seconds West 30.00 feet to the Southeast corner of said Lot 25; thence along the East line of said Lot 25, North 14 degrees 05 minutes 45 seconds East 227.50 feet to the Northeast corner of said Lot 25; thence South 75 degrees 54 minutes 15 seconds East 30.00 feet to the Northwest corner of said Lot 24; thence along the West line of said Lot 24, South 14 degrees 05 minutes 45 seconds West 227.50 feet to the POINT OF BEGINNING, containing 0.16 acres, more or less and subject to any easements of record. (See Exhibit 2 attached hereto.)

(c) 12-foot alley between Lots 22 and 23:

All of that 12-foot wide alley that lies West of Lot 22 and East of Lot 23 and extending from the North right of way of State Street (per plat), now Lanier Drive, to the Westerly extension of the North line of said Lot 22, all in Elias Stapp's West Addition to North Madison, Recorded on December 19th, 1848, in Plat Book 1, Page 55 in the Office of the Recorder of Jefferson County, Indiana, described by Timothy D. Higbie P.S. Indiana #20100067 and based on a survey completed by Survey First LLC as part of project number 20250045 and described as now measured on said survey as follows:

BEGINNING on the North right of way of said State Street at the Southwest corner of said Lot 22; thence along said right of way North 75 degrees 54 minutes 15 seconds West 12.00 feet to the Southeast corner of said Lot 23; thence along the East line of said Lot 23 North 14 degrees 05 minutes 45 seconds East 227.50 feet to the Northeast corner of said Lot 23; thence South 75 degrees 54 minutes 15 seconds East 12.00 feet to the Northwest corner of said Lot 22; thence along the

West line of said Lot 22, South 14 degrees 05 minutes 45 seconds West 227.50 feet to the POINT OF BEGINNING, containing 0.07 acres, more or less and subject to any easements of record. (See Exhibit 3 attached hereto.)

WHEREAS, the Board of Public Works and Safety of said City, at its regular meeting held on February 2, 2026, pursuant to a request by Petitioner, took official action recommending the vacation of said alleys and street to the extent set forth above.

WHEREAS, platted alleys and streets may be vacated within a municipality in accordance with I. C. 36-7-3-12.

WHEREAS, pursuant to I. C. 36-7-3-12 concerning the vacation of public ways, required notice of hearing before the Common Council has been given pursuant to I. C. 5-3-1-2 by the advertisement of a notice of hearing by publication in the Madison Courier, a newspaper of general circulation in the City of Madison, which notice and proof of publication are both on file in the Office of the Clerk-Treasurer of said City.

WHEREAS, all adjacent landowners have been notified of said vacation pursuant to I. C. 36-7-3-12.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MADISON, INDIANA, that:

Section 1. Pursuant to the recommendation of the Board of Public Works and Safety adopted at its regular meeting on February 2, 2026, the Common Council hereby adopts an ordinance vacating the above-described alleys and street.

Section 2. That the following alleys and street are now and hereby vacated as public alleys and street:

(a) 12-foot alley between Lots 26 and 27:

All of that 12-foot wide alley that lies West of Lot 26 and East of Lot 27 and extending from the North right of way of State Street (per plat), now Lanier

Drive, to the Westerly extension of the North line of said Lot 26, all in Elias Stapp's West Addition to North Madison, Recorded on December 19th, 1848, in Plat Book 1, Page 55 in the Office of the Recorder of Jefferson County, Indiana, described by Timothy D. Higbie P.S. Indiana #20100067 and based on a survey completed by Survey First, LLC as part of project number 20250045 and described as now measured on said survey as follows:

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(b) Tillman Street – 30-foot right-of-way:

All of that 30-foot wide right of way of Tillman Street that lies West of Lot 24 and East of Lot 25 and extending from the North right of way of State Street (per plat), now Lanier Drive, to the Westerly extension of the North line of said Lot 24, all in Elias Stapp's West Addition to North Madison, Recorded on December 19th, 1848, in Plat Book 1, Page 55 in the Office of the Recorder of Jefferson County, Indiana, described by Timothy D. Higbie P.S. Indiana #20100067 and based on a survey completed by Survey First, LLC as part of project number 20250045 and described as now measured on said survey as follows:

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Stapp's West Addition to North Madison, Recorded on December 19th, 1848, in Plat Book 1, Page 55 in the Office of the Recorder of Jefferson County, Indiana, described by Timothy D. Higbie P.S. Indiana #20100067 and based on a survey completed by Survey First LLC as part of project number 20250045 and described as now measured on said survey as follows:

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Section 3. The City of Madison hereby reserves for its benefit or the benefit of any private utility which may presently have utilities located upon the above-described alleys and street an easement for public or private utilities located upon the above-described alleys and street and for the maintenance, replacement, improvement, and repair thereof. The City of Madison further reserves for its benefit, or for the benefit of any private utility authorized by the City of Madison, an easement allowing future underground utilities to be installed, maintained, repaired, and replaced in said vacated alleys and street.

Section 4. The Clerk-Treasurer of the City of Madison, upon the final adoption of this ordinance and signature by the Mayor, shall cause a certified copy of this vacation ordinance to be entered upon the transfer records in the Office of the Auditor of Jefferson County, Indiana, and further recorded in the deed records in the Office of the Recorder of Jefferson County, Indiana.

Section 5. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect immediately from and after its passage, enrollment, and signature by the Mayor.



IC 5-11-10.5-2 Outstanding unpaid warrants or checks void

Sec. 2. All warrants or checks drawn upon public funds of a political subdivision that are outstanding and unpaid for a period of two (2) or more years as of the last day of December of each year are void. No individual, bank, trust company, building and loan association, or any other financial institution may honor, cash, or accept for payment or deposit any such warrant or check which may be presented for payment and which has been issued and outstanding for a period of two (2) or more years as of the last day of December of any year.

IC 5-11-10.5-3 List of outstanding warrants or checks

Sec. 3. Not later than March 1 of each year, the treasurer of each political subdivision shall prepare or cause to be prepared a list in triplicate of all warrants or checks that have been outstanding for a period of two (2) or more years as of December 31 of the preceding year. The original copy of each list shall be filed with the:

- (1) board of finance of a political subdivision; or
- (2) fiscal body of a city or town.

The duplicate copy shall be transmitted to the disbursing officer of the political subdivision. The triplicate copy of each list shall be filed in the office of the treasurer of the political subdivision. If the treasurer serves also as the disbursing officer of the political subdivision, only two (2) copies of each list need be prepared or caused to be prepared by the treasurer.

IC 5-11-10.5-4 Content of list

Sec. 4. Each list prepared under section 3 of this chapter must show:

- (1) the date of issue of each warrant or check;
- (2) the fund upon which the warrant or check was originally drawn;
- (3) the name of the payee;
- (4) the amount of each warrant or check issued; and
- (5) the total amount represented by the warrants or checks listed for each fund.

IC 5-11-10.5-5 Procedure upon receipt of list

Sec. 5. (a) Upon the preparation and transmission of the copies of the list of the outstanding warrants or checks, the treasurer of the political subdivision shall enter the amounts so listed as a receipt into the fund or funds from which they were originally drawn and shall also remove the warrants or checks from the record of outstanding warrants or checks.

(b) If the disbursing officer does not serve also as treasurer of the political subdivision, the disbursing officer shall also enter the amounts so listed as a receipt into the fund or funds from which the warrants or checks were originally drawn. If the fund from which the warrant or check was originally drawn is not in existence, or cannot be ascertained, the amount of the outstanding warrant or check shall be receipted into the general fund of the political subdivision. However, in the case of a school corporation, the warrant or check shall be receipted into the operations fund.
