SEPTEMBER 7, 2021**

The Common Council of the City of Madison, Indiana, met in regular session at 5:30 P.M. at City Hall, 101 W. Main Street.

Mayor Courtney opened the meeting with the Lord's Prayer followed by the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag.

Present: Thevenow, L. Dattilo, Rampy, Chatham, Bartlett and D. Dattilo (6-0). Carla Krebs is the new 2<sup>nd</sup> District Council person and will be at the next meeting.

Rampy made a motion to approve the August 17, 2021 minutes, seconded by Bartlett. All in favor, motion carried (6-0).

**BOARD APPOINTMENTS:**

Rampy recommended appointing Hannah Fagen to the Animal Shelter Board and Paula Menke to Police Merit Board. Rampy then made a motion to approve these two as the new appointments, seconded by Chatham. All in favor, motion carried (6-0). Dave Adams thanked Rampy for her service on the Merit Board.

**REPORTS OF CITY OFFICIALS:**

Chief Wallace recognized Detectives Ricky Harris, Sean Scudder and Kyle Cutshaw for their excellent work in the arrest of a suspect in the recent murder on Walnut Street. The quick investigation led to a warrant in about one day. Wallace also presented the Life Saving Award to officers Cameron Blankenship and Josh Nolan. Blankenship and Nolan were involved in an August 28 pursuit that culminated in a fiery crash on Interstate Block Road. The officers removed three victims from the burning car. The backseat occupant had to have CPR administered by the officers to be revived. Wallace also stated that the parking problems along Main and Third Streets during pickups at Lydia Middleton Schools are being addressed with the principal, school resource officer and parents.

Deputy Mayor McGee gave an update on the refurbishing of Main Street along with Gary Newman of National Pavement Maintenance. It was determined with the Board of Public Works and Safety that the refurbishment and liquid scaling phase should be done from curb to curb in two block increments to allow the drying process to take place. This will result in these two block increments being shut down to traffic for a day each.

Mayor Courtney commented that the Prince of Peace Festival, Patriot Day, and the Fairfield Inn VIP Function are all going on this weekend. The Redevelopment Commission approved a

downtown parking study with HWC. A blight elimination strategy is being worked on. This is also in light of the recent murder behind an abandoned building on Walnut Street. Capital investments are needed as it is not fair to the neighbors who care about where they live. The flood and drainage study with the Army Corps of Engineers and the Department of National Resources is ongoing. The drainage problem on Crozier Avenue is being addressed with a contract with Sedam Contracting being approved.

Rampy thanked the mayor for the updates.

Bartlett inquired about Gaines Park and the former Jaycee Park by the bridge as far as improvement plans. Mayor Courtney responded that the parks will be included as part of the READI plans. Also, the parks master plan that is being worked on will also address this issue. Other grants are also being pursued.

Next council meeting is Tuesday, September 21, 2021 at 5:30 P.M. at City Hall.

Thevenow made a motion to adjourn, seconded by Bartlett. All in favor, motion carried (6-0).

- (A) An account is established for the purpose of depositing monies from the granting agency, appropriations from City accounts or from any lawful source for paying the required obligations for the City of Madison on the accepted grant.
- (B) The account shall be named the Indiana Humanities Grant non-reverting fund and all funds contained in the account shall be expended only for the exclusive purpose of paying expenses related to the grant.

**AN ORDINANCE OF THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MADISON,  
INDIANA ESTABLISHING THE HISTORIC PRESERVATION FUND GRANT  
NONREVERTING FUND**

WHEREAS, the State Board of Accounts in their June 2020 Cities and Towns Bulletin has stated that a separate fund for each grant is required; and

WHEREAS, the City of Madison has entered a grant subaward agreement with Indiana Department of Natural Resources Division of Historic Preservation and Archaeology (DHPA); and

WHEREAS, the City of Madison wishes to establish a fund to deposit funds and pay expenses related to the Historic Preservation Fund grant.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Common Council of the City of Madison, Indiana as follows:

- (A) An account is established for the purpose of depositing monies from the granting agency, appropriations from City accounts or from any lawful source for paying the required obligations for the City of Madison on the accepted grant.
- (B) The account shall be named the Historic Preservation Fund Grant non-reverting fund and all funds contained in the account shall be expended only for the exclusive purpose of paying expenses related to the grant.
- (C) The account shall be nonreverting and exist perpetually unless terminated by a subsequent ordinance enacted by the Common Council.
- (D) If the account is terminated by a subsequent ordinance enacted by the Common Council, the remaining balance of the terminated account shall revert to the general budget of the Common Council.
